

THE POETIC INTERPRETATION OF THE CONCEPTS OF TIME, LOVE, AND ETERNITY IN THE SONNETS OF WILLIAM SHAKESPEARE AND RAUF PARFI

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Abstract. This article comparatively examines the artistic expression of time, love, and eternity in the sonnets of William Shakespeare and Rauf Parfi. Both poets explore the transience of life, the power of time, the significance of love, and the possibility of achieving eternity through poetic creativity. Shakespeare presents time as a force that destroys beauty and life, while love and poetry resist its power. In Parfi's sonnets, these concepts are closely associated with inner experience, spiritual quest, memory, and existential concerns. The article analyzes the semantic and poetic features of these concepts through images, metaphors, and artistic contrasts.

In the history of world literature, the sonnet is regarded as one of the genres that has enabled poets to express the most complex psychological and philosophical experiences in a concise poetic form. The sonnet's limited length encourages the poet to present ideas figuratively, with semantic density and multiple layers of meaning. For this reason, universal human concerns such as love, time, beauty, death, memory, and eternity acquire particular artistic and aesthetic significance in sonnet poetry. William Shakespeare, as one of the greatest representatives of the English sonnet tradition, greatly expanded the poetic possibilities of the genre. In his sonnets, the human relationship to life, love, beauty, and time is expressed through complex philosophical and psychological representations. For the poet, time is not merely a chronological concept but an active poetic force that determines the transience of human beauty, youth, and life. The sonnet form also emerges in Rauf Parfi's work as an important manifestation of philosophical and aesthetic thought. In his sonnets, reflections on the inner world of the individual, love, separation, time, memory, life, and death are expressed through distinctive poetic images. In this respect, comparing the sonnets of Shakespeare and Rauf Parfi makes it possible to identify not only the individual poetics of the two poets but also distinctive manifestations of universal poetic thought in English and Uzbek poetry.

A significant part of Shakespeare's sonnets consists of philosophical reflections on time and its impact on human life. The poet portrays time as one of the most powerful and inevitable forces governing human existence. In particular, the relationship between time and beauty occupies a central position in Sonnet 18. As the speaker compares the beauty of the beloved with the beauty of summer, he emphasizes the transience of all beauty in nature:

"And summer's lease hath all too short a date."

In this line, the image of a "lease" granted to summer becomes an important metaphor expressing the limited nature of time. The beauty of summer is confined to a certain period; human beauty is likewise transient. Shakespeare, however, sets the poetic word against this transience. At the end of the sonnet, the speaker asserts that the beloved's beauty will continue to live as long as the poem itself survives:

"So long as men can breathe or eyes can see,
So long lives this, and this gives life to thee."

Here, the principal force set against time is the poetic word. The human body may age and nature may change, but beauty embodied in poetry transcends the limits of time. In Sonnet 60, the destructive power of time over human life is expressed even more explicitly. The poet compares the flow of life through time with the movement of waves in the sea. The waves advancing toward the shore symbolically represent the course of human life from birth toward death. Thus, in Shakespeare's poetics, time is associated with constant movement, decay, and transience.

In Rauf Parfi's sonnets, time also appears as an important philosophical category of human existence. In his poetic interpretation, however, time is often presented not as an external chronological process but as an inner process taking place within the human psyche. Through memory, longing, separation, and emotional experience, time acquires a subjective meaning. Thus, although the common feature of the concept of time in the poetics of both poets lies in its meaning of transience, their approaches differ in the way time is artistically perceived. In Shakespeare, time is portrayed primarily as an external, universal, and inevitable force, whereas in Rauf Parfi it is deepened into a philosophical and psychological phenomenon experienced within the human psyche.

In Shakespeare's sonnets, love is a multifaceted poetic concept. It is interpreted not only as an emotional relationship between people but also as a spiritual force that resists time and death. Sonnet 116 is particularly significant in this respect. It emphasizes that true love does not submit to changing circumstances:

“Love is not love Which alters when it alteration finds.”

In these lines, the defining characteristic of love is identified as its constancy. True love does not lose its essence because of external circumstances, the passage of time, or changes in a person. Thus, in Shakespeare's poetics, love emerges as a value set against time. In the concluding part of Sonnet 116, love is again placed in opposition to time and death. The poet emphasizes that true love does not yield even to the cutting power of time. In this way, love becomes a poetic means of leading toward the concept of eternity.

In Rauf Parfi's sonnets, love likewise serves as a means of revealing the deepest layers of the human psyche. For the poet, love is not merely an emotional state but a spiritual experience that enables an individual to comprehend the essence of existence. Love is accompanied by such states as separation, longing, suffering, and hope. As a result, love becomes a bipolar phenomenon in poetic terms: on the one hand, it expresses happiness and spiritual closeness, while on the other, it conveys separation and suffering.

In Shakespeare, the eternity of love is often grounded in its constancy and preservation through the poetic word. In Rauf Parfi, love attains permanence through the trace it leaves in the human heart, through memory and inner experience. Thus, although both poets share the idea that love triumphs over time, the poetic mechanisms through which this idea is expressed differ.

The concepts of time and love naturally lead to the question of eternity. In Shakespeare's sonnets, poetry is one of the principal means of attaining eternity. The poet envisages his words being read by future generations and thereby preserving the beauty of the lyrical object. This idea is expressed particularly clearly in Sonnet 55. While emphasizing the decay of material monuments before time, the poet argues that the poetic word will outlive them. Here, the poem is interpreted not simply as an aesthetic object but as a form of poetic memory capable of

overcoming time. Thus, in Shakespeare's poetics, three concepts are closely interconnected: time → transience → the poetic word → eternity. Although human life and beauty are transient under the influence of time, they attain permanence through poetry. Love stands at the semantic center of this process.

In Rauf Parfi's work, the concept of eternity is likewise connected with human memory, inner experience, and the poetic word. In the poet's world, human life may be transient, yet the feelings, love, suffering, and memories born in the human heart continue in a spiritual sense. For this reason, poetry emerges as a means through which the individual can transcend the limits of time. However, in Rauf Parfi's poetics, the concept of eternity acquires a more explicitly existential meaning than in Shakespeare. Eternity is associated not merely with preserving beauty but with the search for answers to questions concerning life, death, memory, the spirit, and existence.

A comparative analysis of the sonnets of Shakespeare and Rauf Parfi demonstrates that time, love, and eternity are not three separate concepts but constitute a single poetic-semantic system.

In Shakespeare, time erodes human beauty and life. Love, in turn, resists this erosion. Poetry carries love and beauty beyond the limits of time and into eternity. Therefore, the poetic model in Shakespeare's sonnets may be represented as follows:

Time – a destructive force; Love – a resisting force; Poetry – a means of attaining eternity.

A similar semantic relationship can also be observed in Rauf Parfi's poetics. However, the imprint that time leaves on the human psyche is more pronounced here. Time creates memory, while memory preserves love and separation. Poetry transmits this inner experience to future generations.

Thus, the poetic model in Rauf Parfi may be represented as follows:

Time – a source of inner experience; Love – the spiritual meaning of human existence; Memory and poetry – means of attaining eternity.

The main common feature of these two models is that both poets balance human vulnerability before time with the possibilities of poetic creation. The difference lies in the artistic and philosophical interpretation of this process.

A comparative analysis of Shakespeare's and Rauf Parfi's sonnets reveals common poetic principles in the work of the two poets. First, the transience of human life constitutes an important philosophical problem for both poets. The inevitability of time prompts them to reflect on the nature of human life and love.

Second, love is interpreted as a spiritual value that resists time. Its power is determined by its ability to remain in the human heart and continue through memory.

Third, the poetic word emerges as a means of ensuring eternity. For the poet, creative activity is not merely an aesthetic practice but also a way of preserving human memory and struggling against time.

At the same time, the differences in poetic thought are also significant. In Shakespeare, the questions of time and eternity are often associated with the preservation of beauty, youth, and love. In Rauf Parfi, these concepts are more deeply connected with the human spiritual world, memory, existence, and spiritual quest. While in Shakespeare's poetics the poem itself is one of the principal means of attaining eternity, in Rauf Parfi the poem is interpreted more

broadly as a spiritual phenomenon reflecting the relationship between the human spirit and existence.

A comparative analysis of the sonnets of William Shakespeare and Rauf Parfi demonstrates that time, love, and eternity constitute an interconnected conceptual unity in the poetics of both poets. While time emerges as a force determining the transience of human life, love is interpreted as a spiritual value that resists this transience. Eternity, in turn, is associated with the continuation of human beauty, love, memory, and the poetic word beyond the limits of time.

In Shakespeare's sonnets, time is portrayed primarily as a universal and destructive force. The poet sets love and poetry against it. In particular, Sonnets 18, 55, 60, and 116 clearly reveal the relationship between beauty, love, the poetic word, and time. For Shakespeare, poetry becomes a means of immortalizing human beauty and love. In Rauf Parfi's sonnets, the concept of time is manifested in connection with the inner world of the individual, memory, separation, spiritual suffering, and questions of existence. Love reveals the deepest layers of the human spirit, while memory ensures the survival of these feelings over time. In this sense, the poetic word in Rauf Parfi's work also emerges as an important form of the human aspiration to transcend the limits of time. Thus, despite the differences in the national-cultural and historical-aesthetic experiences of the two poets, their sonnets unite three important concerns common to humanity—the transience of time, the constancy of love, and the aspiration toward eternity—on a shared poetic foundation. In this respect, a comparative study of Shakespeare's and Rauf Parfi's sonnets helps reveal not only the differences between the two literary traditions but also their common features rooted in universal poetic thought.

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
