Lakoff (1975) was one of the first to suggest that women's language is characterized by features such as hedges and qualifiers, which reflect societal expectations for women to be more polite and accommodating. Tannen (1990) expanded on this by contrasting male and female communication styles, arguing that men often engage in competitive discourse while women seek connection and cooperation.

Cameron (2007) further examined vocabulary differences, indicating that women's speech tends to include a broader range of emotional expressions compared to men's more utilitarian

language. Coates (1993) emphasized the collaborative nature of women's communication, suggesting that women are socialized to prioritize relationships over assertiveness.

Eckert and McConnell-Ginet (2003) provided a framework for understanding how societal norms shape linguistic behavior across genders. Their work underscores the importance of considering intersectionality when analyzing language use.

Introduction

3. **Communication Styles:** Women often adopt a collaborative style of communication, focusing on building rapport and consensus (Coates, 1993). Men, on the other hand, are more prone to competitive discourse strategies (Tannen, 1990).

4. **Socialization and Cultural Expectations:** Gender socialization plays a pivotal role in shaping language use. From an early age, individuals are taught to conform to societal norms regarding gendered behavior, which extends to their communication styles (Eckert & McConnell-Ginet, 2003).

Discussion

The findings suggest that while there are observable patterns in how gender influences language use, individual differences must also be considered. Factors such as age, social class, and cultural background can intersect with gender to create unique linguistic profiles. Furthermore, the increasing visibility of non-binary and transgender identities challenges traditional binary notions of gender and their linguistic implications.
